


For God and Country

On the first Thursday of this month, we will celebrate Independence Day. This has historically been understood as an American holiday rather than a religious holiday. Recently, however, there's been more and more public discussion about the relationship between Christianity and patriotism.

Some Christians see God's goals and our country's goals as one and the same and view it not as their civic duty but as their Christian duty to love and support America. They point to Paul's teaching in Romans 13. "Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities," Paul writes, "for there is no authority except that which God has established." As Lutheran Christians, however, we want to ensure that we are not merely good citizens but that we are first and foremost faithful Christians. As such, we want to interpret biblical texts properly to understand their original intent and meaning.

The Roman Empire was the governing authority when Paul wrote the book of Romans. Paul was writing from a context in which the Roman authorities were not friendly to Christians. Paul had Roman citizenship (which protected him to a certain extent), but not all Christians did. By the beginning of the second century, the Christian community experienced rapid growth, and the Romans were concerned that Christians would quickly take over the empire.

Polycarp, a disciple of John, is the best-known martyr of this period in Christian history. Because he was elderly, the soldiers who arrested him wanted to give him a way out of his death penalty. So, they told him all he had to do to escape death was declare, "Caesar is lord." But, Polycarp refused and instead



As Americans, we still enjoy the freedom of religious expression. We would do well to ponder the question, "If those freedoms were taken away, would we still worship and serve the Lord without renouncing Him for anything or anyone?"

History reminds us that the Romans did not appreciate Christians declaring, "Jesus is King." In Acts 17:7, we read about Paul and Silas in Thessalonica. The whole city is in uproar because they are preaching and teaching about "another king, Jesus." Towards the end of Jesus' earthly ministry, when the chief priests and the teachers of the law are seeking to get rid of Jesus, they turn to the government they aren't thrilled with to accomplish this goal, arguing, "Anyone who claims to be a king opposes Caesar" (John 19:12).

We would do well to be reminded that it is indeed Almighty God who sets up and deposes kingdoms (Daniel 2:21). Jesus reminds us in the prayer He teaches His disciples to pray, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." And so we live with this understanding that this side of eternity, no matter which nation we live in, will be filled with imperfect leaders, with sin and with brokenness.

As Christians, the universal principal of living out our faith remains. We show honor and respect to those in positions of authority. "Give to everyone what you owe them," Paul explains. "If you owe taxes, pay taxes; if revenue, then revenue; if respect, then respect; if honor, then honor" (Romans 13:7). We have countless reasons to be thankful and grateful as Christians and as Americans not only on Independence Day but always. Living in thankfulness for this great nation while we remain unwavering in our complete allegiance to Jesus Christ is one of many ways we can show others that in Christ alone do we have true and everlasting freedom. With these thoughts in mind, may you have a wonderful and thankful Fourth of July!
