From the Pastor

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." -2 Corinthians 5:17

Happy New Year! How many times have you celebrated a new year? For me, the number currently stands at 47. At times, that seems like such a small number, but when you begin to unfold the year into months and the months into days of the week and the days of the into hours, you begin to realize how much time is truly packed into each year. Sometimes, the days, weeks, months and years begin to blur together, and one season collides with another. Why do we celebrate New Year's Day? It seems like it is just another day, so why mark every new year on a calendar? It's because new beginnings mean you have been given another chance, a fresh start. There's a reason the month of January sees an influx of new gym memberships being purchased and people signing up for new diet programs. It is a chance to start again, to improve yourself or to prove to yourself that change is possible.

The Christian life offers many opportunities for fresh starts and new beginnings. Even in our worship as Lutheran Christians, we begin with a time of confession where we admit what we've done wrong. We confess to God and to each other that our lives are not perfect, that we're not living the way the Lord calls us to live, that we're doing things we ought not do and failing to do things we ought to do. We need a fresh start in our spiritual lives as much as in our physical lives.

What is God's response? We hear the Good News that because of God's forgiveness and the sacrificial love of Christ Jesus we get a fresh start. The Psalmist writes it this way in Psalm 103:12: the Lord has taken our sins away from us "as far as the east is from the west." The slate is wiped clean. You don't need to carry the weight of your sin or guilt of the past with you into 2025. You are forgiven!

The reality for us on this side of eternity, however, is that it doesn't take long for us to forget about all that the Lord God has done for us. Like a lapsed gym membership, our commitment to desiring lasting change wanes. The same can happen in our spiritual life if we stray from God's Word, from worship and from joining in community with others. When we are tempted to stray, the Lord draws us back to Himself again and again by His Word and the power of the Holy Spirit. He loves us and will never give up on us.

In his Small Catechism, Martin Luther explained how we can maintain a robust relationship with the Lord: "In the morning, as soon as you get out of bed, you are to

make the sign of the holy cross and say, 'God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit watch over me. Amen.' Then, kneeling or standing, say the Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer... After singing a hymn, or whatever else may serve your devotion, you are to go to your work joyfully."

You don't have to wait for a new year to have a fresh start. Each new day offers the opportunity to remember that you are a Baptized and forgiven child of God through faith in Jesus. He will never break that commitment to you. May you live daily in this truth. Happy New Year!
